
# **Assumption Church Walkinstown**

#### **Mother Teresa of Calcutta**

Parishioners Jerry and Kitty Doyle, late of St. Peter's Road, and Fr. Denis Foley, to honour Mother Teresa's compassion and dedication to serving the poor, planted a three and laid a plaque in her Honor on the grounds of the Church in 1989.



Mother Teresa of Calcutta was entrusted with the mission of proclaiming God's thirsting love for humanity, especially for the poorest of the poor. "God still loves the world, and He sends you and me to be His love and His compassion to the poor" She was a soul filled with the light of Christ, on fire with love for Him and burning with one desire: "to quench His thirst for love and for souls."

Mother Teresa was a woman of strong faith and conviction, born in Skopje, Macedonia in 1910. Despite being Albanian by blood and Indian by citizenship, she identified as a Catholic nun and servant of God. Her love for souls began at a young age, and her desire to become a missionary led her to join the Sisters of Loreto, Rathfarnham in Dublin in 1928 at the age of 18 years. She received the name Sister Mary Teresa after St. Thérèse of Lisieux and went on to found the Missionaries of Charity order in India. Her order grew rapidly, with hundreds of centers in over 90 countries and thousands of nuns and lay workers.

Mother Teresa's compassion and dedication to serving the poor earned her international recognition, including the Nobel Peace Prize. Despite her global fame, she remained humble and devoted to her mission. She maintained strong ties with Ireland, returning many times and receiving the Freedom of Dublin in 1993. During the Troubles in Belfast, she sent her sisters to provide aid to those in need.

## The Body of Christ

And his blood, and his soul, and his divinity. The Eucharist is ALL that Jesus is. Man and God. ACTUALLY all of that in reality and not merely spiritually or symbolically. This is the very centre of our faith.

So, when we receive communion, as we should do to fully participate in the Mass, we receive Jesus, wholly and entirely. But we receive him not because we should but because we love him, and this is the most intimate way we can be with our beloved and he with us. This is the very centre of our relationship with God. The only thing that could prevent us from receiving Jesus is grave sin and in that case we should be reconciled as soon as possible. St. John Paul II suggests an approach to worthily receiving the Eucharist that you may never have thought of:

# **Imagine Mary's first communion**

Imagine the Blessed Virgin Mary at her first Mass, whenever that happened, receiving her beloved son and the God she adored into her body for the second time. Imagine how she would have prepared in anticipation of this and then her overwhelming joy to have her son dwelling within her again! Think how she would have expressed her love and received his in those sacred moments. The great pope points out the profound connection between Mary carrying Jesus in her womb and a person receiving communion. In a sense, we become like Mary every time we receive the Eucharist. How awesome is that!

# Simone Biles, Olympic Gymnast, Her Faith

Simone Biles is a five-time Olympic medallist and has said her Catholic faith is a source of inspiration, energy and strength.



Born in Columbus, Ohio, USA Simone is considered the greatest gymnast of all time.

When Simone was five years old, her grandparents, whom she refers to as mom and dad, adopted her and her siblings as her biological mother struggled with drug addiction. They instilled the family with a faithful Catholic identity, regularly attending Mass on Sundays. Simone said her Catholic faith is not just a set of beliefs, but a way of life. It guides her in making moral choices, finding comfort in times of struggle, and sharing love and compassion with others. She finds strength in the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, and participates in various religious activities.
